Fr. Bob Longobucco visited Avila on several occasions in January for Board meetings, an ecumenical prayer service, and our interview with him. He was ordained a priest of the Albany Diocese 26 years ago. Currently, he is the Vicar General of the Diocese, moderator of the Diocesan Curia, serves as Pastor of St. Kateri Tekakwitha Parish in Schenectady, and is vice president of the Diocesan Corporation as well as a member of Avila's Board of Trustees.

After graduating from high school on Long Island, he enrolled at the University of Albany, which he identified with a smile as the best Catholic university in New York based on its excellent campus ministry at the Newman Center, where he encountered many fellow students who became lifelong friends. After graduation, he was employed in the State Legislature for four years. At 26, he decided to enter the seminary for a career in the priesthood because "it just felt right." Those formative years became significant through encounters with priests like Fr. Tony Marone, Jack Molyn, and Leo Markert, who helped him shape a prayerful discernment process leading to the call to the priesthood.

When we asked what the major tasks are facing the Avila Board members, he outlined four main targets: the tax situation with the City

of Albany, creating a sustainable operation path for Avila, understanding retirement community research on sustaining a positive culture, and establishing funding for capital expenditures. He appreciates the information supplied by Kathleen for the Board's consideration and the need to support her efforts in planning for future improvements. He believes the best advertising and marketing tool is the current residents who have established a supportive and nurturing environment in Avila.

Fr. Bob hopes that residents understand they have the dedicated support of the Bishop and that the Board is working to achieve wholeness for each resident's health, social well-being, and spirituality. He expects the Board to continue communicating with residents and become even more knowledgeable about what residents need and desire in this outstanding retirement community.

We inquired again why he selected the University of Albany. With a great laugh, he responded that other Catholic colleges rejected his application (which we doubt). When asked what he liked best about visiting Avila, he quickly responded, "There are so many great features about this facility, such as residents' friendliness and sense of happiness, but I also find the chocolate chip cookies are delicious!"

When we finished our interview, Fr. Bob was off to his evening meetings at the parish, hoping he could squeeze in time for a quick dinner. We found him dedicated to his ministry and his participation in Board activities. We were grateful for the time he shared with us and for his talents and insights into the future of Avila. We thank him and many others who give their time freely to support our retirement community.

SISTER AGNES CHIMBAYO, RSCJ

Sister Agnes Chimbayo is the most recent member of the Society of the Sacred Heart of Jesus to become a resident of the Lodge at Avila. She is a native of the land-locked country of Malawi, formerly the British colony of Nyasaland, located in Africa south of Tanzania, east of Zambia and north and east of Mozambique.

She was raised in the Anglican faith in a family of ten children, becoming a Roman Catholic in her early 20s. Sister Agnes joined the Daughters of Charity Canossian, taking final vows in 1986. She worked as a nurse, midwife and in the dispensary. As a midwife, Sister Agnes delivered over 500 children. During her sabbatical in the United States, beginning in 1997, Sister Agnes expanded her formal education while reexamining her lifetime religious commitment to the Canossians. She began the process of transfer to the Society of the Sacred Heart in 1999, becoming a full member in 2003. She had spent 23 years with the Canossians and has since

been with the RSCJs for 22.

Prior to coming to Avila, she served as a chaplain in a Chicago hospital. She has done and continues to do podcasts for Radio Maria. At Avila she will serve as a chaplain, providing pastoral care to her fellow sisters.

He was highly regarded by his patients for his caring manner and professional expertise. He delighted in making sure his patients learned proper dental hygiene.

His community service work included volunteering dental services at St. Colman's Home for Boys. He was given an award of distinction for his contributions to the student body of University at Albany.

Joan went to the High School of Music and Art in New York City, to Emerson College, and to Columbia University where she received her master's degree in speech pathology and audiology.

Much of her adult life was given to community servi ce, serving on many boards, including the Saratoga Performing Arts Center, the Ladies Auxiliary of Memorial Hospital, and Albany Institute of History and Art. She was a major fundraiser for the Double H Ranch for critically ill and terminally ill children in Lake Luzerne.

In 1989 Joan and two partners formed *Panoply Foods*, a brokerage to supermarkets. The company, now run by her daughter Robin, represents over 60 suppliers in several states. Joan still monitors the progress of the business.

The Friedmans have a townhome in Green Harbor on Lake George. It is enjoyed on many occasions by the entire family. They have had the opportunity to travel to Europe and Africa. They also enjoyed several riverboat cruises.

They have two daughters, Dr. Alison Sullivan and Robin Ginac and two granddaughters.

Their three grandchildren are a joy: two granddaughters aged 16 and 19 living in Slingerland and a grandson aged 22 living in Illinois.

After beginning his GE career in Syracuse, Art was transferred to Oklahoma City, OK, with his entire division. Joan continued her teaching career there but quickly realized the differences in resources between teaching in Syracuse, NY, and Oklahoma. Her new teaching location had no special education, music, or art teachers. Those assignments were the function of regular classroom teachers. Joan enjoys saying that the lack of a musical curriculum resulted in her sixth-grade class singing repeatedly the one song everyone knew, "Oklahoma." When they expressed an interest in joining a retirement community, their daughter took the opportunity to highlight Avila and its nearness to her and the grandchildren. They are now eager to embrace this new chapter in their lives, close to family, and new friendships.

Avila residents eagerly look forward to receiving their next issue of *News and Views*, which is published in February, May, August, and November. Reading the 12-14 pages, we learn about new residents, events, celebrations, staff recognition, poetry, and motivational stories. Its publication requires time and effort from several residents who write, photograph, edit, and duplicate before it reaches our hands.

For this special 20th Anniversary edition, we interviewed Lynn Altonin and Erin Teichman, the co-editors of *News and Views*, to highlight its beginnings, growth, content, and appeal. Lynn and Erin are supported by eight editorial staff residents who prepare articles, pictures, and generally map out the content of each edition.

Lynn served as layout editor from 2012 to 2018 when she and Erin became co-editors. Don Layton and Lore Scurrah were the early editors when *News and Views* grew from a black and white, two-page, cut-and-paste, offset printed publication of the Residents' Council to its present form with color pictures and graphics that appeal to today's readers. Lynn reports that each issue usually requires 20-30 hours of her time to organize and print issues. Erin commented that the co-editors always look forward to feedback from residents about the articles and pictures they enjoyed, information about new residents, and other articles that "catch the fancy" of residents. Both felt they were willing to give their time, knowing that the newsletter enriches residents' awareness of each other and current Avila "news and events." Prospective residents frequently request copies to better assess if Avila's social life and culture suits their needs and interests. The publication has also been placed on Avila's website to acquaint larger audiences with the positive features of living at Avila.

The editorial board meets six weeks before publication to organize interviews of residents, Avila Board members, and staff, and to generate ideas for articles, pictures and descriptions of Avila events and poetry.

Residents who might be interested in joining the editorial board to suggest or author short articles are welcome to contact Lynn or Erin at any time. The editors and editorial board members are delighted by *News and Views'* growth over the last twenty years, pleased by the positive reception each issue receives from readers, and encouraged by the value it serves in our community. Residents also look forward to the continued growth of this publication. When Lynn was asked jokingly, "Have you started planning for the 25th Anniversary edition?"
